Welcome back to school! We hope you had a restful break. The children have started the new term with great gusto and enthusiasm as ever.




Article of the Half Term - Article 16

Article 16 of the UNCRC makes it clear that children and young people have the *right to privacy*, just like adults do. This means that:

they have the right to a private family life, they have the right to a private space where they can go to be alone, even if they're in an institution, and they have the right to keep their phone calls and emails private.





Storytelling A new term brings a new storytelling book. This term we are sharing The Red Bicycle by Jude Isabella and Simone Shin. The main character is a bicycle that starts its life like so many bicycles in North America, being owned and ridden by a young boy. The boy, Leo, treasures his bicycle so much he gives it a name --- Big Red. But eventually Leo outgrows Big Red, and this is where the bicycle's story takes a turn from the everyday, because Leo decides to donate it to an

organization that ships bicycles to Africa.

English We have begun our new campaign in support of the children in the inpatients ward at St Peter's Hospital. Just like Leo donated his beloved bicycle to the organisation which sent bikes to Burkina Faso, we are planning to collect toys for the children by running our own campaign. We began by writing to the play specialist, Claire,



at St Peter's asking what kind of toys the hospital would be able to accept. We had a reply yesterday! Next steps will include the children advertising their campaign, sharing it across the school and with our families and working out the logistics of collecting the toys.

Points of View We had an interesting topic about driverless cars this week! We thought about how this might impact on people's jobs and also about how safe it would be.

Maths We have been working on capacity this week. We investigated the capacity of different fizzy pop bottles, estimating and measuring in millilitres.

Science Our new topic is animals Including Humans (Humans to old age) We thought about the different stages of life from gestation, infancy, childhood, adolescence, adulthood to old age. We talked about what the changes might look like at stage.

Children Around the World Before we begin our new topic this term, we are finishing our learning about World War 2. This week we learned how women's roles changed drastically once the war began and the impact this had on Britain's ultimate victory. The jobs ranged from land girls and ARP wardens to military positions, transport workers, firefighters and code-breakers to name but a few.

RE We have been looking at how artists express their religious beliefs.
